Be sure to vote November 3, 2015!





Commodity Supplemental Food Program

The Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) was established to provide nutritious commodities to help state and local agencies supplement food resources to low-income seniors. Through local agencies, each participant receives a monthly package of commodities, based on food package guide rates developed by the United States Department of Agriculture, Food and Nutrition Services (FNS). Food packages include items such as milk, cereal, juices, canned fruits and vegetables, canned meat/non-meat protein items, and grain products such as pasta or rice. Participants also receive nutritional education. CSFP is designed to serve individuals whose income and circumstances make them especially vulnerable to malnutrition.

The Mississippi Food Network (MFN) administers the CSFP under an agreement with the State Department of Health/WIC Program to receive, re-package and distribute the donated USDA supplemental foods through local charitable/non-profit agencies in the authorized counties.

Golden Triangle Planning and Development District is the local site in Oktibbeha County to distribute Commodity Supplemental Food Boxes (CSFP). At the present 200 boxes are distributed each month to low-income seniors age 60 and older. Currently, 7 individuals are on the Waiting List.

All participants must be 60 years of age and older, meet the CSFP household income eligibility guidelines and reside in the selected CSFP county. Income guidelines are updated yearly by USDA and are based on the Federal Poverty Level (FPL).

Golden Triangle Planning and Development District(GTPDD) is a nonprofit organization formed in June 1970 to improve and enlarge economic development and civic improvement in the Appalachian counties of Choctaw, Clay, Lowndes, Noxubee, Oktibbeha, Webster and Winston within the state of Mississippi. The goal of the organization is to assist local units of government and small businesses with highly specialized areas that fall outside of the customer's range of expertise. This includes assistance in applying for and managing grant monies, technical support for local government and small businesses, administrative functions and support for local utilities, and geographic information system (GIS) data and mapping that is needed for county management. GTPDD is an affiliate of the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) created in 1965 by an act of Congress. ARC's objective is to provide additional grant funding and support infrastructure growth to create a competitive economic environment within the 13 Appalachian states in the U.S.

Challenge

GIS mapping and data is a time-consuming and expensive process but is necessary for providing key information relating to parcel mapping, road management and census reporting. This type of information is used to define political jurisdictions at state and local levels and manage tax rolls. It is also used for comprehensive community planning. None of the GTPDD counties has a budget or manpower to support such an extensive project. However, as part of its support, GTPDD provides this service and manages the data. Winston County actually qualified for grant funding to help support this project with the grant covering 80 percent of cost. The community is responsible for the other 20 percent. Over an eight-month period in 2012, GIS data and mapping had been completed for the entire county. This included information for structures within city limits, as well as items found outside of the community, such as cell towers, water towers and barns.

On April 28, 2014, Mississippi had nine tornadoes touch down with an F4 storm passing through Louisville, MS, located in Winston County. There were 10 deaths attributed to this particular storm within a 36-mile path. The event was so devastating that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) immediately qualified the region as a National Disaster Area. After the initial cleanup and first-responder needs, the process of applying for federal disaster loans had to begin. However, property owners had to prove what structures were in place prior to the storm and send information validating the current status of their properties. This could take months and delay any relief money. GTPDD had all of the mapping

Solution

Toby Sanford is the GIS Manager and Senior Analyst for the GIS program at GTPDD. Several years earlier, Toby reviewed the GE MapSight™ solution and remembered it. Following the storm, he reached out to a contact at Landmark Spatial Solutions, which he knew both used and sold the equipment. Landmark Spatial Solutions agreed to loan him the device to capture data and images along the path of the storm. MapSight is a complete solution that integrates a digital camera with a laser-range finder, sub-meter GPS and a compass to capture calibrated images that can define location and structure measurements. It was a quick process to move from location to location and use the device to take images of the carnage and destruction left behind by the tornado. Using the MapSight solution, Toby and his team mapped 646 points in 1 ½ days.

Result

Based on the expedited GIS data collected through MapSight, Winston County management assessed the cost of the storm and the direct impact to county budgets within 24 hours. In addition, the necessary recovery information for Winston County was presented in full to both FEMA and the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) within 48 hours, and it was processed completely by the agencies within 28 days of the storm. This is currently the fastest storm-recovery response in history within the state of Mississippi. In April 2015, one year later, other counties affected by this series of storms were still compiling the needed paperwork delayed by their lack of GIS documentation.

Since this event, GTPDD has invested in its own GE MapSight device and uses it exclusively to manage its GIS data within its jurisdiction.

Elderly and Disabled Waiver Program

What is the Elderly and Disabled Waiver?

It is a statewide program designed to offer assistance to qualified Medicaid beneficiaries. The program allows qualified individuals to remain in a home or community-based setting as an alternative to a nursing facility or other institutional care. All persons who are eligible to receive Home and Community-Based Services under this waiver must first be approved through the Division of Medicaid.

Who is qualified?

- Be 21 years of age or older.
- Qualify by either SSI or 300% of SSI.
- Score 50 or above on the Medicaid Long Term Care Pre-Admission Screening (PAS) instrument
- Must require nursing facility level of care, if assistance is not provided.

What services are offered under this waiver?

- **Case Management** Everyone who participates in the waiver is assigned to a local case management team. This team consists of a Registered Nurse and licensed Social Worker.
- **Personal Care Services** These are supportive services provided in the home of the participant. They include assistance with light housekeeping, laundry, meal planning, marketing, food preparation, etc.
- Adult Day Services This is a structured program that focuses on the strengths and abilities of the participants. This service allows participants to make connections with their community and/or use all of their retained skills. Depending on the specific facility, the following services are provided: supervision and/or assistance with ADLs, group activities, nutritious meals, and medication monitoring.
- **Expanded Home Health Services** The participants of this program are eligible for extended home health services. Covered services include: nurse, aide, physical, and speech therapy.

• **Home Delivered Meals** - A well-balanced meal is delivered to the home of the person who is unable to leave his/her home without assistance and/or unable to prepare his/her own meals.

- **Institutional Respite and/or In-Home Respite** This is provided to participants on a short-term basis because of the absence of or need for relief for the primary care giver. This can be provided in the home or licensed respite care centers.
- **Transition Assistance** This is provided to a beneficiary currently residing in a nursing facility who wishes to transition from the nursing facility to the E & D Waiver in the home.

Grant. The Eupora Police Department was also able to purchase a new



Tribute to Sarah Stevenson

Each year the Golden Triangle Planning & Development staff has the opportunity of working with a multitude of youth. Many of these youth prove to be exceptional, eager-to-learn individuals, working and planning for their futures. However, one of the young people during the 2014-2015 program year really stood out in the crowd. She is Sarah Stevenson from the Panhandle Community in Choctaw County.

Sarah enrolled as a twenty-one year old participant in the WIOA (Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act) Counseling to Career (C2C) Program. Sarah graduated from Weir High School in May of 2012. Prior to C2C participation she had not pursued her goal of becoming a Registered Nurse. She spent a lot of time caring for her elderly grandparents with whom she lived. From day one of program involvement, Sarah showed leadership potential. Her confidence and determination spilled over into the classroom where her attitude, smile, and self-motivation were pronounced. Teresa Shumaker, Sarah's Career Counselor, stated, "Sarah was a fantastic, well rounded student. She was very humble and when she set her mind to achieve a goal, she made it happen. Sarah never used personal barriers as an excuse. She is an inspiration to the young and old alike."

Upon completion of work ethics training, youth are placed at worksites to practice the skills they have learned in the classroom. Sarah's WIOA placement was with Choctaw Regional Medical Center working as an ER Tech. There she proved to be such a valuable asset to the business that Jimmy Owens, Hospital Administrator, sent her a personal thank you note for the professionalism and compassion she showed to a trauma patient and his family during an ER visit. He shared with the WIOA staff that she had proved to be a tremendous asset to the hospital but in order to continue working in the ER after her C2C work experience Sarah needed to continue her education. This motivated Sarah to pursue her Certified Nursing Assistance certification at East Central Community College, Louisville Center. Sarah completed her C.N.A. classes in late May, passed her certification test and was hired at Choctaw Medical Center in July as an ER Tech.
