GTPDD prepared to use new mobile mapping system for county mapping

The Golden Triangle Planning and Development District is prepared to use a state-of-the-art mobile mapping system for county mapping next year.

Acquired through an Appalachian Regional Commission grant, the GTPDD Mapping and GIS team's Trimble MX50 mobile mapping system uses light detection and ranging to measure distances for mapping.

Using light in the form of lasers, the Trimble MX50, attached to a truck, can measure two million object points per second while traveling at speeds up to 75 mph and collecting 20 GB of 3D mapping data per mile.

The Trimble MX50 can extract features such as power poles, street signs, address points, curbs and gutters, power lines, slope of the road and more.



With these feature extractions, the new equipment can help the GTPDD counties with highway assets, utility assets, city assets, accurate ground models, engineering profiles and cross-sections, road surface information, addressing and more.

With the team ready to begin mapping Choctaw County in 2024, the GTPDD is excited to take this new equipment out on the road in our counties and get to work.

GATEWAY IN-SCHOOL WORKFORCE PROGRAM TRAINEE POSITIONS OPEN

The GTPDD's Gateway In-School Workforce Program is celebrating completion of another year in Choctaw, Oktibbeha, Webster and Winston counties!

In early August, the WIOA staff began the recruitment of junior and senior Career Center students interested in obtaining a Career Ready Certificate, developing workforce skills and practicing those skills through an internship in a local business where salary and workers' comp are paid through WIOA funds.

The ultimate goal is that the youth, with the help of the Gateway Career Counselors, will find full or parttime employment, continue their education or enlist in the military. The WIOA staff continues to work with the youth for a minimum of twelve months after their program internship to enhance the youth's chances of meeting one of these goals.

Program progress indicates that at the end of December, 61 youth were certified into the program. All 61 of these youth completed essential job skills training. Forty-seven of these participants chose to begin their internship immediately, while the remaining 14, due to personal and school related obligations, chose to begin their internship hours in January 2024. For most of these students, this is their first job, so their first paycheck is a milestone to remember.

The staff also has been working with 87 youth who completed the program last year to assure they stay on a positive track. According to the latest report, 95 of these youth (95%) have met their goal of employment, continuing their education or joining the military.

The WIOA staff is very proud of the accomplishments of these young people and the contribution they are making in their local communities.

Positions are available for 30 self-motivated, energetic, dedicated-to-succeed youth living in Lowndes, Noxubee and Webster counties to participate in this innovative program during the spring 2024 semester. Participants must be in school and of junior or senior standing, preferably enrolled in Career Tech classes.



HOME AND COMMUNITY-BASED ELDERLY AND DISABLED WAIVER PROGRAM

What is it?

The Elderly and Disabled (E&D) Waiver is a statewide program designed to offer assistance to qualified Medicaid beneficiaries. The program allows qualified individuals to remain in a home or commuity-based setting as an alternative to nursing facility care or other institutional care.

What are the qualifications?

- 1. Beneficiaries must be 21 years of age or older;
- 2. Medicaid eligible;
- 3. Require the same level of care as someone applying for admission to a nursing facility.

What services are offered under this waiver?

- **Case Management:** Everyone who participates in the waiver is assigned to a local case management team. This team consists of a Registered Nurse and Licensed Social Worker. They are responsible for managing and coordinating the services for each participant.
- **Personal Care Services (PCS):** These are supportive services provided in the home of the participant. They include assistance with light housekeeping, laundry, meal preparation, bathing, dressing, personal hygiene and activities of daily living.
- Adult Day Services: This is a structured program that focuses on the strengths and abilities of the participant. This service allows participants to contact connections with their community and/or use all of their retained skills. Depending on the specific facility, the following services are provided: supervision and/or assistance with ADLs, group activities, nutritious meals and medication monitoring.
- Home Delivered Meals: A well-balanced meal is delivered to the home of the person who is unable to leave their home without assistance and/or is unable to prepare their own meals.
- **Institutional Respite and/or In-Home Respite:** This is provided to participants on a short-term basis because of the absence of or need for relief for the primary care giver. This can be provided in the home or other licensed respite care centers.
